Pancake Flipping!!





A DAY IN THE LIFE, SIXTH FORM



What is it like to study as a Sixth Form student in Ysgol Harri Tudur? Here is a insight into a typical day in Sixth Form.

Sixth Form community

As a student in Sixth Form there are multiple roles and activities you can get involved with. Throughout the day Sixth Form students have 2, thirty minute breaks, where they are encouraged to use within the Sixth Form common room, a social space accessible to the Sixth Form. The canteen and shop are available to use by Sixth Formers for food and students are not required to wait in the queue.

Mentor time is attended by Sixth Formers at the beginning of the day, much like lower down the school it is used as time for school announcements, important information and a learning and organisational time via vespa activities - focused around vision, effort, systems, practice and attitude. helping Sixth Form students to achieve

Year assemblies happen once a fortnight in The Sixth Form common room and Sixth Form students are also required to attend house assemblies weekly.

Facilities -

The library offers a range of books, textbooks and information articles with additional use of laptops that can be borrowed by Sixth Formers to use within the library.

The Sixth Form study room has a range of desks, study areas including desktop computers, individual seating for silent and focused revision time, with larger tables set up for group revision/activities. With its new addition of a resource table the Sixth Form space now has a range of whiteboards, whiteboard pens, paper etc. that sixth form students can borrow to aid in their studies.

The common room facilities include, a range of sofas, chairs, tables a kitchen area including a free drinks vending machine, fridge-freezer, sink, kettle for students to use.

Sixth Form have access to IT classrooms when they are not in use as additional space, access to separate toilets from the lower year pupils all via their student id cards.

With this great range of facilities, Sixth Form students have the independence to choose where they want to spend their study periods in the day and find the right environment suited for them to ensure students get the most out of their education.

Opportunities, support and preparing for the future

Sixth Form helps to prepare students for the future, no matter what their career direction - university, apprenticeships or stepping into the world of work. Students can expect to receive the support needed through a- levels enhanced with field trips, guest speakers, visits to universities eg - Oxford and Swansea, career events and work experience opportunities. sixth form provides a connection to programs such as "step up to university" and summer schools as well as the Seren Network which allow students a chance to explore their options and gain experience towards their future.

Social Action Project.



I have now been working for this same company for 8 years, working in construction comes with its pros and cons depending on the individual. I have moved to 5 different cities for work to progress my career: Oxford, Bristol, London, Sydney and Melbourne. So, I have had to sacrifice stability in my lifestyle to continue growing in my profession, but that's not to say I have lived in some beautiful cities (but they are far from home). If I could advise the younger me again I would say to her "Challenge anything you don't understand and challenge it again until you do. Don't settle on a person just cause they speak the loudest, and you have your work cut out for you if you ever have to manage a construction individual with an ego and a title."



Attendance Matters!

Many thanks to parents and learners for high levels of attendance throughout the last term. December and January are always quite challenging months with regards seasonal ill health and holiday requests but I am incredibly impressed by how most learners either maintained high attendance or recovered from short term absenteeism at this time; da iawn chi! The school values and respects learners' own efforts in minimising absences and thanks parents for their support in encouraging high attendance and for contacting the school whenever an absence is unavoidable.

With regards individual year groups, I must congratulate Year 11 who demonstrated excellent attendance during the first Spring half-term during their mock examinations. It was clear evidence that almost every learner can attend when faced with assessments and exams. It is important to note of course, that every day's attendance for Year 11 now has added value in the run up to their examinations and every lesson of every day counts, as it does of course in every year group. The higher Year 11's attendance during the next half term, the higher their individual potential for success. The school asks every Year 11 learner, and their parents/carers, to ensure that they attend the maximum possible school sessions over this incredibly important period, whilst also making every attempt to attend the various revision sessions led by staff after school.

Whilst we recognise and celebrate learners' commitment and resilience in attendance across all year groups (as we have again done this week), we equally try to support those learners whose absences are becoming a cause for concern; not with the intent to chastise or rebuke, but in order that we can better understand particular learners' needs or barriers to better attendance faced by some learners and their families. We understand that some learners face anxiety with regards attendance, however where learners miss school due to feeling anxious, that can actually become a vicious circle as the

longer they are away, the more anxious they become about returning, due to the possible impact of absence on their interaction with friends and on missed work. The school would like to remind learners, parents and carers that we have excellent support for learners who may feel this way and we urge parents to speak to Mentors in the first instance about possible pastoral support, ELSA access or referral to the School Counsellor via Ms Emily Morgan.

Our Attendance Clinics have moved to telephone contact for initial attendance reviews (Letter2A) to aid better parental engagement with significant success thus far, but they remain in-person meetings on alternate Tuesdays with senior staff where worsening absences are noted (Letter 2B) as an indication of escalated importance. The school does not make the decision to refer learners to the Education Welfare Service lightly, instead we prefer to engage with parents constructively at the Attendance Clinic meetings; nevertheless, in the best interests of learners, we must follow local authority and national guidance where increasing absences cannot be authorised or parents elect to disengage with the school by missing meetings.

One increasing cause for concern is learners arriving late to school. Where learners attend late they may miss their AM attendance mark and therefore may still be legally classed as absent until the Lesson 4 PM attendance session. Therefore, can I respectfully request that parents/carers ensure their children are in school for the start of the school day. Poor punctuality immediately places learners at a disadvantage and lessens the value of school in learners' minds if persistent, leading to increased disengagement on the part of learners. I would also urge parents to support the school's message that learners should arrive at classes promptly within the school day and not socialise with friends beyond the start of lessons in corridors. Whilst staff regularly encourage learners into classes, a small minority of learners in all years intentionally delay their arrival. Late arrivals impact everyone in affected classes and we ask parents at home to reinforce and support good discipline and punctuality in this respect as internal truancy will not be tolerated.

As the summer term draws near, Year 11, 12 and 13 will enter their exam periods. These different years will have varied examination schedules and Year 12 are reminded that unlike Years 11 and 13, they return to school in June for the continuation of lessons up until the end of the school year. I know that staff responsible for leading these years will be communicating instructions, advice and guidance in the coming weeks and I ask that parents/carers ensure they discuss them with learners in detail, especially with regards exam attendance and appropriate resources. With regards the Summer, it is the time during which we receive the largest number of requests for holidays during term time. We would like to remind parents and carers that these requests are only authorised in exceptional circumstances. We would also like to remind parents and carers that accurate information should be given regarding absence and the school takes a dim view of parents calling in to give notice of a learners' medical absence when the family is actually abroad on holiday, as has been the case on more than one occasion recently. We may not be able to authorise an in-term holiday request, but we do ask that parents are open and honest.


Finally, I would like to remind all parents/carers of the

need to support medical appointments by sending in copies of hospital, dental or opticians (etc) appointment letters or even photos of prescribed medications. We also have an arrangement with St Oswald's / Argyle Street surgeries enabling parents or learners to request a confirmation card from their receptionists which will simply record the date & time of pupils' GP appointments for ease of reference. We ask for this information to support absences which can easily be evidenced in order to prevent the unnecessary sending of Attendance Clinic letters. We welcome them for all absence for which they can be provided, but especially those which result in extended learner absence. Photos or scans of the above can be simply emailed to attendance@yht.wales, alternatively paper copies can be left at the school's Reception.

I hope all parents and learners enjoy a peaceful and relaxing Easter and, in the hope that the sunshine will be a little more present when we return in April..


